New Bakery Opens Today and Invites Trenton Patronage

Pastry and Bread on Display
That Will Tickle Palate
Of an Epicure

Trenton people who have been eating bread made by a dozen different bakeries in a half-dozen different towns will not have to do that any longer. Today the Elliot Bakery opened its doors to Trenton people and will henceforth offer them Trenton-made baked goods and bread made of the best and purest ingredients by a baker whose skill bears testimony to his inheritance of the skill of his French forefathers.

The Elliot Bakery is owned by William H. Elliott, a lifelong resident of Wayne County, and is at 2656 West Jefferson Avenue, in the building owned by F. C. Affolter, situated immediately south of the Affolter Grocery.

Mr. Elliott was born at Northville, has spent all his business life there, and for the last 12 years has run a bakery there. He comes to Trenton after having considered a half-dozen other possible locations, including Wyandotte. He states that he concluded to come to Trenton because it was a good residential community, because it was well recommended to him, because there was no bakery here, and because he thinks Trenton has a promising future.

The building has been thoroughly renovated and re-decorated and a concrete addition 15x15 feet built at the rear to house the oven and work room. Mr. Elliott has moved to Trenton the equipment, all comparatively new, with which his Northville bakery was equipped. The pastries on display when The Times man visited the bakery Thursday morning bore evidence of the sufficiency of equipment, as well as to the skill of Emile Vincent, long a baker for Mr. Elliott, who, though a native-born American, is of the

French descent whose culinary skill is proverbial.

The bakery will offer a full line of breads—yeast, salt-rising, whole wheat, buttermilk graham, rye and raisin—pastries and pies. Special orders of any kind of baked goods will be made, as well as birthday and wedding cakes, hand-decorated to order.

It is Mr. Elliott's intention to move here as soon as personal matters will permit. His family consists of himself, Mrs. Elliott, and a son, Walden, who at 28 is past high priest of the Northville Royal Arch chapter.
